Vol. 1 Growing Superfoods in Space: A Leap Towards Sustainable Space Agriculture

Group Captain Shubhanshu Shukla, an Indian Air Force test pilot and astronaut candidate, is set to embark on the Axiom Mission-4 (Ax-4) to the International Space Station (ISS) on June 8th, 2025. This mission, a collaborative effort involving NASA, ISRO and the ESA, marks a significant milestone in global space exploration endeavors.

A central focus of Shukla's mission is to conduct pioneering experiments on cultivating green gram (moong) and fenugreek (methi) seeds in the microgravity environment of the ISS. These nutrient-rich crops, staples in Indian cuisine, were selected for their potential to provide sustainable food sources for astronauts on long-duration missions.

Space based agriculture is no longer just a futuristic novelty; the groundwork is happening right now. Missions like Astronaut Shukla's demonstrate how real-world science is bridging the gap between science fiction and practical capability.

This experiment underscores the very essence of Starfleet's guiding principles, innovation, sustainability and the pursuit of knowledge for the betterment of all life. This experiment not only pushes the boundaries of our current knowledge on space agriculture but also reinforces our commitment to self-sufficiency on long duration missions. This achievement will bring us closer the Star Trek vision of peaceful exploration, where science and diplomacy go hand in hand. Where even the simplest act, growing food, becomes a symbol of unity, progress and the dream of exploring the stars.

From the log of LTJG Saral Ayo, Science Officer, USS Destiny

Our assignment seemed straight forward; investigate a derelict Federation vessel transmitting a distress signal on repeat from the edge of a class 7 temporal rift. Designation: USS Hamilton, reported missing in 2292.

Upon approach, the Destiny's sensors detected a 17-minute looping energy pattern. With every cycle, the Hamilton reappeared intact, then fractured apart. A boarding team from the 521st MSG and Science Division was deployed during a reset window. The vessel was real; and the crew was caught in a temporal echo, reliving their final moments over and over again.

Environmental conditions inside the loop were stable. Systems functioned as intended. But the deeper we explored, the more we felt... watched. Logs indicated the crew had encountered an Iconian beacon before disappearing. Somehow, the Hamilton's proximity to the beacon, and now the rift, had locked it in a stuttered death spiral.

We managed to extract primary logs and a beacon fragment just before the next collapse. One Marine's recorder caught a shadowy figure appearing between deck reflections for 0.3 seconds. Science Division has no current explanation. Temporal Command has flagged this region as "Observation Only".

Three days after departing the Theta V rift, the Destiny experienced a near catastrophic systems failure. What began as a mild sensor interference escalated into a full shutdown of warp and primary life support. No known anomaly was present in space. No energy signature matched any log in the Starfleet database. Except one.

During the blackout, I reviewed our Theta V data. Frame by frame, in spectral subbands, the shadow figure from the Hamilton's deck flickered, faintly, on the Destiny's own bulkhead cameras. At first, we thought it was a software echo. But then the lights dimmed. A voice; genderless, amused, and terrifyingly curious. Spoke directly into our minds: "Why do you fear being watched when you spend so much of your lives doing the same?"

Captain Sowers ordered an immediate psi-scan. No results. No origin point. Just silence. Then, with a blink, everything returned to normal. Warp power, artificial gravity; restored as if nothing happened. Engineering found no faults. Tactical suggested it was a Q-like presence.

I have filed a sealed report with Starfleet Intelligence and the Department of Temporal Investigations. We are advised to not speak openly of it, even here.

Vol. 1 Away Mission: Point Defiance Zoo & Aquarium, Tacoma, WA

In May 2025, LTJG Patrick and CMDR Jen of the USS Destiny beamed down to the Point Defiance Zoo and Aquarium (PDZA) in Tacoma, Washington.

PDZA has the distinction of being the only combined zoo and aquarium in the Pacific Northwest. The 29-acre zoo was established in 1905, while the aquarium was founded in 1935 and relocated to the zoo in 1963. Although the original zoo and aquarium were less humane and reportedly unsafe, the PDZA of today is nationally accredited by the Association of Zoos & Aquariums (AZA) and the Alliance of Marine Mammal Parks and Aquariums (AMMPA), dedicated to conservation and preservation of wildlife, upholding the highest standards of animal welfare and veterinary care, education and commitment to matters of environmental and social justice.

There is something for everyone: areas to encourage children to play outdoors, and interact with some of the animals of the zoo. Zoo keepers are available to chat about the animals in their care, and visitors with zoo members can schedule behind-the-scenes tours (CMDR Jen is still trying to convince LTJG Patrick to join her on the shark dive experience). Short on time, on this outing the duo opted to visit the two aquarium facilities located on the premises: the Tropical Reef Aquarium and the Pacific Seas Aquarium:

The renovated Tropical Reef Aquarium, previously known as the South Pacific Aquarium, was reopened to the public in mid-2024 after being closed in November 2021 for restoration and repair. The 25,000 square foot facility houses a number of shark species in the Outer Reef which mimics a sandy ocean-drop into a natural reef, a lagoon ecosystem, and the "Blue Hole" which represents deep caverns inhabited by tropical marine life. The fish of this aquarium are brightly colored and are absolutely mesmerizing to watch. Visitors can experience shark dives with the sharks in this exhibit, and the tropical shallows tide pools invite visitors to carefully touch some of the resident tropical sea stars, sea cucumbers, shim, crabs and tropical urchins.

The Pacific Seas Aquarium, opened in September 2018 to replace the aging North Pacific Aquarium, is a 35,000 square foot aquarium that represents the varied ecosystems in the waters of the Pacific and contains an interactive tidal touch zone where visitors can interact with marine life typically found in Pacific Coast tidal pools.

The modern facility is home to a 100,000-gallon habitat full of Pacific Northwest marine life such as anemones, barnacles, rockfish, ratfish, salmon, sturgeon and lingcod; a Coastal Kelp Forest exhibit echoing the kelp forests of Southern California; colorful jellyfish displays and an amazing peek of the marine life that lives under the Tacoma Narrows Bridges. The aquarium also hosts a 280,000-gallon warm-water habitat called Baja Bay which is home to scalloped hammerhead sharks, green sea turtles, spotted eagle rays and various fish species.


